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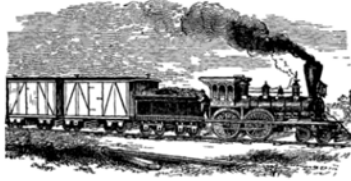
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P R E F A C E .

In presenting this book to the public, the publishers desire to state a few facts in connection therewith. At the time of its inception *no directory*, containing in one book all the places comprised herein, *had ever been published*, and the undersigned were the *first* to announce the publication of such a work; it being the intention to include therein nearly all the territory formerly known as "Old Naumkeag."

Of the many improvements inserted herein, attention is called to the following:—The street directory of Salem is much improved by its arrangement in double columns, and the designation of such streets as have been accepted by the city; the names of the inhabitants in the several places specify in cases of widows, both their names and that of their husbands; the business directories contain many improvements, that of Salem embracing a full list of all the insurance companies represented in Salem, with the names of their agents; and the official and society matter in all the places is much fuller and more complete than usually found in works of this character. The dates of the expiration of the commissions of justices of the peace and notaries public, are also given. It also contains a large and handsome map of the whole district, with circles showing the half mile distances from city hall in Salem; plans of Mechanic Hall, Salem, and of the three principal theatres in Boston, showing the location of seats; interesting historical matter from 1626 to the present time; together with valuable tables compiled from the United States census returns for 1880, in the presentation of which we are indebted to the kind assistance of Col. Carroll D. Wright, Chief of the Mass. Bureau of Labor.

We are also indebted to the president of the Essex Institute for the historical and other interesting matter contained herein, and to many friends for kind advice and assistance, also to our many patrons for their generous support; to all of whom we return our warmest thanks.

The work, considering the fact that all the material therefor was compiled from manuscript, has been issued at as early a date as accuracy would permit; a careful inspection of the large amount of detailed information contained herein, we feel certain, will satisfy our numerous patrons in this regard.

The publishers have endeavored to present a work satisfactory to the citizens of the whole district, and one in which all can take pride, and feel assured that it will bear favorable comparison with others of its kind. With the publication hereof, a new business enterprise has been started in this community, which we trust will continue to receive the generous support of its citizens. It will be issued regularly, and many improvements will be included in the next edition. The publishers will always endeavor to make it second to none other published in this vicinity.
