REGULATIONS.

[Ext. General Statutes, Chap. 26, § 5.]

The Board shall make such regulations as it judges necessary for the public health nd safety. * * * * Whoever violates any such regulation shall forfeit a and safety. sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

Regulation 1. All persons are strictly forbidden throwing any filth or slops of any kind into the streets, back-yards or alley-ways.

Reg. 2. All cellars must be properly drained and ventilated to keep them dry and healthy; and no stagnant water or filth of any kind shall be allowed to remain on any vacant land or under any building, thereby causing a nuisance. *Reg.* 3. No privy vault shall be con-structed so that the contents shall enter

any sewer, or shall fall in or upon any dock flats or tide water within the limits of the city, and no privy shall be within two (2) feet of the line of the next lot, un-less the owner of said lot gives his consent. *Reg.* 4. No contents of a privy vault, or waters from any sink drain shall be per-

mitted to overflow, or run upon the sur-face of the ground, or upon any street or sidewalk, or into any street gutter. All such vaults shall be thoroughly cleaned out and the contents thereof removed once in each year, and oftener if the Board of Health so direct.

Reg. 5. No person shall remove or car-ry through any public street, highway or square of the city, the contents of any vault or privy, unless the person removing the same, and the cart, wagon or other conveyance in which the same is carried, shall be licensed for such purpose by the Board of Health, and no such removal Shall be made between the first day of April and the first day of November. *Reg.* 6. No person shall cart filth or dead animal or vegetable substance on any

vacant lots or public places, or into any waters within or adjoining the city, or cause any animal to be drowned in said waters.

Reg. 7. No swine shall be kept within the limits of the city, unless a permit for this purpose has been granted by the Board of Health. And all pens shall be kept free from standing water.

Reg. 8. No persons will be allowed to keep fowls, goats or other animals in cellars or basements of any dwelling houses.

Reg. 9. No animals affected with an infectious or contagious disease shall be brought within the limits of the city. No diseased animal, or its flesh shall be sold or offered for sale, and no decayed or diseased or unwholsome meat, fish, vegeta-bles, fruit or other article of food shall be sold, or offered for sale in the city.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

Reg. 10. Every person in whose house there shall break out a case of cholera, yellow fever, small pox or varioloid, shall immediately notify the Board of Health of the same, and, until instructions are re-ceived from the Board, shall not permit any clothing or other property that may have been exposed to infection to be removed from the house, nor shall any occupant take up a residence elsewhere without consent of the Board.

Reg. 11. Any physician who may know of or be called to a case of either the dis-eases specified in the foregoing regulations, shall at once report such case to the Board of Health and receive their instruc-

tion in regard thereto. Reg. 12. No persons sick with any of said diseases shall be removed at any time, except by permission and under the direction of the Board of Health, but all persons infected with either of said diseases, who cannot be properly quarantined, may

be removed, according to law, to such hospital or other place as the Board of Health may direct, and when any person dies of either of said diseases, the body shall be buried under direction of the Board of Health, and no person shall obstruct, hinder, or oppose such burial.

REG. 13. All bedding and personal clothing or other personal property affected with contagion or infection, shall be

disposed of or treated as the Board of Health may direct.

REG. 14. No person or article liable to propagate a dangerous disease shall be brought within the limits of the city, without special consent and direction of the Board, and whenever it shall appear to any person that such person or article has been brought into the city, immediate notice thereof shall be given to the Board, specifying its character and location.

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION ADVANCEMENT OF SCIENCE. FOR THE This association dates its origin to 1840, when on the 2d of April of that year, some eighteen gentlemen, principally connected with the several State Geological Surveys then in progress, met in Philadelphia and organized under the name of "The Associ-ation of American Geologists." At the meeting in Boston in 1842, it was decided to enlarge the object so as to include the collateral branches and the name to that of "The Association of American Geologists and Naturalists." In 1847 the objects were still further enlarged so as to include all departments of science. A new organization was effected under the present name, and the first meeting was held at Philadelphia, Sept. 20, 1848. This associ-ation is republican in its organization and migratory in its visits, meetings having been held in various cities of the Union and Canada annually except during the years 1861-1865, when they were sus-pended in consequence of the unsettled condition of the country. A volume of proceedings has been printed for each of these meetings. The office of the permanent secretary is over the Mercantile Bank, Central st, Salem. The annual meeting for 1883 will be held at Minneapolis.

ESSEX INSTITUTE. / This institution was formed by the union of the Essex Historical and Essex County Natural History Societies, in February, 1848. The former society was incorporated in 1821, the latter in 1836. In February, 1870, an act was passed enlarging the powers of the Institute so as to include among its objects, the promotion of the arts, science and lit-erature, in addition to those of the original societies. Its library contains about 36,000 volumes bound, and about 120,000 pam-phlets, exclusive of duplicates, and embracing all departments of literature. museum contains a large collection of an-tiquarian and historical relics, paintings, engravings, medals, coins, paper curren-cy, &c. The scientific portion is deposited in the Museum of the Peabody Academy of Science. At the time of its removal, the collection contained over 125,000 specimens in the departments of Ethnology, Imens in the departments of Ethnology, Zoology, Botany, Mineralogy and Geology, Scientifically arranged, and in good part labelled and catalogued. Its publications are the "Proceedings of the Essex Insti-tute," 6 vols.; "The Naturalist," vol. 1, (afterwards transferred to the Peabody Academy of Science); "Bulletin of the Essex Institute," 13 vols., Svo.; "Histori-cal Collections of the Essex Institute," 17 vols., Svo. The Historical Collections and vols., 8vo. The Historical Collections and Bulletin are regularly issued. Field meetings are held in different parts of the county for scientific and historical investigation and discussion. Evening meetings for the same purpose are regularly held during the winter at the rooms of the Institute. The Institute also gives courses of scientific and other lectures, and series of concerts during the winter months, and Horticultural and Art exhibitions, during the Spring, Summer and Autumn months. Its rooms are in Plummer Hall Salem, so-called in honor of Ernestus Augustus Plummer, whose sister, Miss Caroline Plummer, cherishing his memory, and directing that her gift should be recorded in his name, bequeathed to the proprietors of the Salem Athenæum the sum of \$30,000, to be expended in the erection of a suitable building for scientific and literary purposes. PEABODY ACADEMY OF SCIENCE; This institution was founded by George Peabody, who, on the 26th of February, 1867, placed in the hands of nine trustees the sum of \$140,000, for the promotion of science and useful knowledge in the County of Essex. He directed \$40,000 to be applied to the purchase of the East India Marine Hall, in Salem, and other lands adjoining thereto; the fitting up and fur-

nishing the same for the proper arrange-ment of the Museum of the East India Marine Society, and the scientific collec-tions of the Essex Institute, conditional by the two institutions to place them therein on special permanent deposit. The remaining sum of \$100,000 is invested as a permanent fund, the income only of which can be used for the purpose of the trust. The various alterations having been completed in August, 1869, Wednesday, the 18th of that month, the first day of the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, in Salem, was taken to dedicate the Museum to the uses for which it was de-signed by the founder. The collection of the East India Marine Society, which is especially rich in the native implements of the Pacific islands, and in specimens illustrating the costumes and habits of the inhabitants of various countries in the East Indies, and the Essex County collections of the Institute, are its marked features, and the many additions that have since been made contribute largely to its value and interest. The Museum is open to the public every day (Sundays excepted), from 9 A. M. to noon, and from 1 to 5 P. M. The Academy has printed six of its annual and five memoirs. "The American Naturalist," vols. 2 to 10 were also printed under its auspices. A summer school of Biology has been held for six weeks, commencing the first of July, for the past seven years, except the sea son of 1882. This was commenced under the direction of Prof. A. S. PLUMMER FARM SCHOOL OF REFORM FOR BOYS. This school was founded by the bequests of Miss Caroline Plummer. It is a school of reform for boys in the city of Salem. SALEM ATHENEUM was incorporated in March, 1810. Its conception was suggested by the Boston athenaeum, organized some three years eahier. The charters of the two institutions are in many respects similar, the leading objects of both being the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences. The founders of the Salem athenaeum were actuated by high motives and laid a broad basis for future operations, commencing at first with a library, and trusting to the future for the further extension of their views and plans. To this end they purchased the social and philosophical libraries. The former was organized in 1761; the latter in 1781. The athenaeum rooms in Central building, Market (now Central) street were opened to the proprietors on Wednesday, July 11, 1810. with a goodly collection of books upon the shelves, duly arranged and properly classified. In April, 1815, the library was removed to rooms in Essex place; in 1825 to rooms over the Salem bank; in 1841 to Lawrence place, and in 1857 to Plummer hall, the present resting place for this valuable and increasing collection of books. The present number of volumes, about 19,500. Miss Caroline Plummer, daughter of Dr. Joshua and Olive (Lyman) Pluthmer, born Jan. 13, 1780, and died at Salem, May 15, 1854, bequeathed to the proprietors of the athenaeum \$30,000, for the purchasing of land and the erecting thereon a building known as Plummer hall, in which are deposited the libraries of the Salem Athenaeum, Essex Institute. The next evening a few persons came together in the parlors of Benjamin H. Silsbee, Esq., to confer upon the matter further. Other meetings followed at the same place and resulted in the formation of the *Salem Fraternity*, object "to provide evening instruction and amusement" for such of our population as "being confined to their work during the day need recreation

at the close of their labors." On the evening of the 21st of April, 1869, the western range of rooms on the second floor of Downing's Block, 175 Essex st., was opened for the purpose from front to rear. The place was well chosen, central, accessible, attractive in its principal rooms, while the thoroughfare of the Es-sex st. promenaders led directly past its door. The Amusement Room.—The num-bers in attendance fluctuates with the season and with the attractions outside. In the warm weather and short evenings In the warm weather and short evenings a few only will appear. During the long winter evenings, especially if cold and White evenings, especially if cold and stormy, this comfortable room is much prized. The average attendance in 1875 was 200, in 1876 was 230. The average of July 1876 was 85, December of the same year 481. The Library.—It began with a tew shelves of books, miscellaneous and unselected, in a small back-room. There are now 4221 volumes in the library; 500 for reference only. The takers of books number 1107. This library has been gathered by gift wholly. It is the only free public library in Salem. Its large num-ber of readers shows an active circulation. The Reading Room is supplied with the Salem papers by the favor of the publishers, and from some of their offices come. besides, many of their most desirable exbesides, many of their most desirable ex-changes; several daily and weekly news-papers, pictorial weeklies, religious, sci-entific, and literary periodicals, find their way to the tables at a very small outlay of money. Seven Magazines and twenty-eight papers are regularly received. Wo-men's Room.—On the first of Jan, 1879, a room was set apart for women to meet in for reading, conversation and possibly for industrial instruction, and for an employment reference room. In 1875 the Fraternity became incorporated under the Statutes of Massachusetts. School Room.
