In 1867, East India Marine Hall, erected in 1824, was purchased and refitted for collections. It now contains the Museum of the East India Marine Society, commenced 1799, and the Natural History Collection of the Essex Institute, commenced 1834, received as permanent deposits, besides accessions since made by the above-named Societies and the Trustees of the Academy. The Museum is especially rich in the Ethnology of the South-Sea Islands, China, Japan, Africa, India, etc., and contains an almost complete collection illustrating the Natural History and Archæology of Essex County. It is open, free to the public, every week-day, from 9 to 5 o'clock. The average number of visitors for lifteen years is upwards of 25,000 annually.

The Academy has published six scientific memoirs, besides annual reports, and classes and lectures in Botany and Zoölogy have been regularly conducted.
