3. CITY ORPHAN ASYLUM OF SALEM, No. 215 Lafayette st. Organized 1866 Conducted by twelve Sisters of Charity, Lady Superior, Sister B. Mary Cleary. This institution provides a home for orphan boys and girls, who receive a due amount of education in the common branches of learning.

4. ESSEX INSTITUTE. Open from 9

A. M. to 5 P. M. from October to May and from 9 A. M. to 5.45 P. M. from May to October. This institution was formed by the union of the Essex Historical and Essex County Natural History Societies, in February, 1848. The former Society was incorporated 1821, the latter in 1836. In February, 1870, an act was passed enlarging the powers of the Institute so as to include among its objects the promotion of the arts, science and literature, in addition to those of the original societies. Its library contains about 82,830 volumes bound, and about 285,922 pamphlets, exclusive of duplicates, and embracing all departments of literature. Its museum contains a large collection of antiquarian and historical relics, paintings, engravings, medals, coins, paper currency, etc. The scientific portion is deposited in the Museum of the Peabody Academy of Science. At the time of its removal the collection contained over 125,000 specimens in the departments of Ethnology, Zoology, Botany, Mineralogy and Geology, scientifically arranged, and in good part labelled and catalogued. Its publications are the "Proceedings of the Essex Institute," 6 vol.; "The Naturalist," vol. 1 (afterward transferred to the Peabody Academy of Science); "Bulletin of the Essex Institute," 30 volumes, 8 vo.; "Historical Collections of the Essex Institute," 35 vols. 8 vo. The Historical Collections and Bulletin are regularly issued. Field meetings are held in different parts of the county for scientific and historical investigation and discussion. Evening meetings for the same purpose are regularly held during the winter at the rooms of the Institute. The Institute also gives courses of scientific and other lectures, and series of concerts during the winter months, and horticultural and art exhibitions during the spring, summer and autumn months. In June, 1894, a local history class was formed by the ladies of the Institute. Its meetings are held in one of the library

rooms, when papers on subjects relating to Salem's early history are read and discussed by the members. The building next east of Plummer hall, built by the late Tucker Daland, has been purchased by the Essex Institute, and has been remodelled and arranged to accommodate its library and collections. It also occupies the first floor of Plummer Hall, in which is deposited a portion of its library, and where the lectures, meetings, and exhibitions are held. Robert S. Rantoul, Pres.; Francis H. 5. ST. JAMES EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTE, No. 162 Federal street. Lady Superior, Sister Florentia. Teachers, fifteen sisters of Notre Dame.

ST. MARY'S EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTE, No. 13 Walnut street. Superior, Sister Mary de Paul; teachers, The Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, whose mother house is at Madison, N. J.

6. PEABODY ACADEMY OF SCIENCE, 161 Essex street. Open from 9 A. M. to 5 P. M. Sundays, 2 to 5 P. M. The "Trustees of the Peabody Academy of Science," organized in 1868, having received funds by gift in 1867 from George Peabody of London, for the "Promotion of Science and Useful Knowledge in the County of Essex."

Under the instrument of trust, East India Marine Hall (erected in 1824), was purchased and refitted, and the Museum of the East India Marine Society and the Natural History Collections of the Essex Institute received by the trustees as permanent deposits were placed therein. To this foundation have been added many valuable collections since received by the trustees. A new exhibition hall was added and opened in 1889.

The arrangement of the Museum is *educational*, and not merely for the purpose of exhibiting curiosities. It is especially designed to aid the teachers of the county in connection with school work. Cards on many of the objects give lists of books in the Salem Public Library relating to the collections.

The collections in the public exhibition halls may be summarized as follows:—

I. A collection of the animals, minerals and rocks of Essex County. A collection of woods of the trees of Essex County, and one of the pre-historic relics of the county. A large collection of the dried plants of the county, in cabinets, in the lower rooms, may be consulted by students on application at the office.

II. A synoptical collection illustrating the animal kingdom, from the lowest to the highest forms, arranged according to the text-books in common use in our schools and colleges. Letters upon the cases indicate the order in which it should be examined.

III. A type collection of minerals illustrating the edition of Dana's Mineralogy, used in our schools, and a collection illustrating the historic geology of the earth.

IV. A collection of objects illustrating the dress, religious customs, implements of war and of domestic use, and objects of art of the native races of China, Japan, Siam, India, Korea, Africa, the Pacific Islands, Malay regions, and Philippines, and North and South America, etc., in the new east hall. This collection originated in 1799 with the formation of the East India Marine Society, and has had an uninterrupted existence since that date. It was greatly increased in 1868 by the specimens received from the Essex Institute, and large additions have since been made by the Academy trustees.

V. An historical collection of portraits of prominent Salem merchants, members and officers of the East India Marine Society, together with many interesting relics connected with the early social character of that institution, and models and pictures of Salem merchant vessels. These form an interesting memorial of the commercial history of Salem.

The Academy has published two volumes of memoirs and annual reports; it has conducted classes in botany, mineralogy and zoology, and for several years held a summer school of biology. Lectures upon subjects connected with natural history and ethnology are given annually in Academy Hall.

The average number of visitors to the Museum is about, 50,000 annually.

The Museum is open *free* to the public every week-day from 9 A. M. to 5 o'clock P. M. and Sundays from 2 to 5 P. M.

The large addition, built in 1885, for the purpose of increasing the Museum accommodations, has on the lower floor a fine lecture hall, known as Academy Hall. It has a seating capacity of 350, is centrally located, comfortably seated, well ventilated, and is in every respect a first class audience room. The hall is used for lectures by the academy, and is rented for concerts, lectures and readings.

The museum offices are on the lower floor of E. I. M. Hall, rear rooms.

7. PLUMMER FARM SCHOOL OF REFORM FOR BOYS. This school was founded by the bequest of Miss Caroline Plummer. It is a school of reform for boys in the city of Salem. The amount of the bequest was \$25,000. Present fund \$50,000. Incorporated May 21, 1855. Building erected in 1870, and the school was opened Sept. 23, 1870. Jeremiah T. Mahoney, Chairman; — Secretary; John E. Stanton, terms expire 1906; William H. Jelly, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, terms expire 1902; Wm. S. McIntire, George M. Whipple, terms expire 1903; Matthew Robson, Frank S. Atwood, terms expire 1904; Geo. H. Allen, Francis H. Lee, terms expire 1905; Superintendent, C. A. Johnson; Matron and Housekeeper, Mrs. C. A. Johnson. A generous bequest of \$35,000 was left to the school by the will of the late Capt. John Bertram. Number of boys in school, 30.

8. SALEM ATHENÆUM was incorporated in March, 1810. Its conception was suggested by the Boston Athenæum, organized some three years earlier. The characters of the two institutions are in many respects similar, the incorporated objects of both being the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences. The Salem Athenæum purchased the social and philosophical libraries. The former organized in 1761, the latter in 1781. The Athenæum rooms in Central building, Market (now Central) street, were opened to the proprietors on Wednesday, July 11, 1810, with a good collection of books, properly arranged and classified. In April, 1815, the library was removed to rooms in Essex place; in 1825, to rooms over the Salem Bank; in 1841 to Lawrence place, and in 1857 to Plummer Hall. The present number of volumes, about 24,500. Miss Caroline Plummer, daughter of Dr. Joshua and Olive (Lyman) Plummer, born Jan 13, 1780, and died at Salem, May 15, 1854, bequeathed to the proprietors of the Athenæum \$30,000, for the purchasing of land and the erecting thereon a building known as Plummer Hall, in which are deposited the libraries of the Salem Athenæum, Essex So. District Medical, Essex Agricultural Societies, and a portion of the library of the Essex Institute. The Athenæum is managed by trustees, annually chosen by the

stock holders; each share holder may take out books upon payment of the annual assessment of five dollars. Trustees, Richard C. Manning, Frederick P. Richardson, John Robinson, Dr. David Choate, William O. Chapman, Joseph N. Ashton, William H. Gove, Alden P. White; R. C. Manning, President; J. N. Ashton, Clerk; Frederick P. 9. SALEM BOARD OF TRADE. Organized June, 1901. Meetings held first Thursday of each month. Officers are elected in April. W. S. Felton, Pres.; A. P. White, Vice-Pres.; C. H. Danforth, Sec.; Geo. A. Shepard, Treas.; George W. Pickering, Wm. S. McIntire, D. G. Whelton, H. M. Batchelder, J. J. Connelly, Geo. W. Pitman, Jas. F. Donovan, Reuben Arey and the Mayor ex-officio.

10. SALEM MARINE SOCIETY. Instituted March 25, 1766. Incorporated April, 1772. Meetings held last Thursday evenings of January, April, July and October, at Franklin Building. Officers elected at annual meeting in October. Nathan A. Batchelder, Master; Nathan H. Millett, Treas.; Edw. B. Trumbull, Clerk.

11. SALEM EAST INDIA MARINE SOCIETY. Founded in October, 1799. Incorporated in 1801. Membership restricted "to persons who have actually navigated the seas beyond the Cape of Good Hope or Cape Horn." Its chief objects: 1st, to assist the widows and children of deceased members, who may need it, from the funds of the Society; 2d, to collect such facts and observations as tend to the improvement and security of navigation; 3d, to form a museum of natural and artificial curiosities, particularly such as are to be found beyond the Cape of Good Hope and Cape Horn. The collections formed were first deposited in the building on the corner of Essex and Washington streets. In 1804 they were removed to the Salem Bank Building, on the site of Downing's Block, and in 1825 to the East India Marine Hall, erected for the accommodation of this valuable collection. In 1867 the building was sold to the Trustees of the Peabody Academy of Science, and the Museum was placed in the hands of the Academy as a permanent deposit. Although no longer conducting the Museum, or making nautical observations, the charitable objects of the society are fully carried out through the meals of a fund of considerable amount in possession of the society. Meetings are held quarterly at E. I. Marine Hall. Officers elected

annually on first Wednesday in January. President, William H. Jelly; Secretary, Nathan A. Bachelder; Treasurer, Nathan H. Millett; Committee of Observation, Edward D. Ropes, Albert P. Goodhue; Distributing Committee, J. Clifford Entwisle, Edward B. Trumbull.

12. THE SALEM FRATERNITY was organized in 1869 to provide evening instruction and amusement for those who "being confined to their work during the day need recreation at the close of their labors."

A few years' experience showed that the greatest need was among the boys and young men. Thus began the work of the oldest "Boys' Club" in the Country. After renting various rooms, a permanent and suitable "home" for the work was secured in 1899 in the "Old Bank Building," at 11 Central street. A part of the work for the year ending Oct. 1, 1900, was as follows:—The rooms were open (except holidays), evenings from 7 to 9 o'clock, mornings from 8 to 10.30 o'clock (except during the seven "camping out" weeks), afternoons from 4 to 5 o'clock from Oct. 1 to Apr. 1. The total attendance was 50,192 boys, an average of 160 per day. The entertainment and instruction was largely provided by Volunteer Helpers.

The Indoor Work. The gymnasium and shower baths are open every day from 7 to 9 P. M., from Oct. 1 to Apr. 1; it is open to all from 4 to 5 P. M., and during the evening it is reserved for members of the gymnasium classes which are in charge of instructors. The boys pay 10 cents per month to attend these classes. Total attendance 16,398.

Classes were maintained in Printing, Cobbling, Carpentering and Free-hand Drawing during the winter.

The Wood Yard gives the boys a chance to work on condition that their earnings become savings, or that they be expended for necessaries. Over 600 boys applied for work in this department. The receipts of this department were about \$100 the first year.

A Reading Room and Library of 700 "Books for Boys" are maintained.

The Game Room is perhaps the most important of any department, for it is here that the personal influence of the Volunteer Helper touches the life of the boy in his play and with lasting effect. The number of boys admitted to this room depends upon the number of Volunteer Helpers.

The Outdoor Work has consisted of Holiday Excursions, Base-ball and outdoor Athletics at the Bridge Street Grounds, and seven weeks of "Camping

Out" during the summer, when 76 boys were given "a week in the country."

The "Stamp Savings Bank" is an important feature of the work. Results.—Over 100 accounts opened by the boys in the "Five Cent Saving's Bank" in 18 months

13. SALEM HOSPITAL. Organized April 7, 1873, from a fund contributed by Capt. John Bertram and other citizens. Applications for admission to be made to the house surgeon at the hospital, 31 Charter street. Open for the reception of visitors on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 2 to 4 P. M. Annual meeting fourth Wednesday of January. Arthur W. West, President; Trustees, Oliver D. Way, Edward D. Ropes, E. Aug. Emmerton, Walter H. Trumbull, Arthur W. West, George Chase, Matthew Robson, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, William G. Barker, John Robinson, Edward C. Browne, William P. McMullan; Treasurer and Clerk, Edward L. Millett; Attending Physicians, Joseph P. Fessenden, F. S. Atwood, H. J. Gaffney, S. Foster Quimby; Attending Surgeons, Thomas Kittredge, B. R. Symonds, Edward L. Peirson, James E. Simpson; Physicians and Surgeons to out-patients, Hardy Phippen, Ara N. Sargent, George C. Littlefield, Benj. F. Sturgis, jr.; Dental Surgeon, H. R. Peach; Superintendent, Miss Martha P. Parker; House Surgeon, Frank B. Mitchell. A training school for nurses is connected with the hospital, its object being to supply Salem and vicinity with educated nurses. The time required for the education of a nurse is two years, at the end of which diplomas are given to those pupils who have fulfilled all the requirements.

14. SALEM PUBLIC LIBRARY. On the first of December, 1887, the heirs of Capt. John Bertram offered to the city his late residence on Essex street to be used for the purpose of establishing a Public Library. On the twenty-seventh of December, 1887, the city accepted the gift and instructed its committee to petition the Legislature for authority to issue bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for the use of the library. The library was open to the public for the delivery of books, July 8, 1889. There are now in the library June 1, 1901, 41,000 volumes. By the provisions of the deed of gift the management of the library is vested in a board of seven trustees, six elected for life by the City Council, and the Mayor of the city for the time being, the re-

maining member, *ex-officio*, and the chairman of the board. The City Council elected the following named gentlemen as trustees for life: George R. Emmerton, James A. Emmerton, Nathaniel A. Horton, Thomas F. Hunt, Charles S. Osgood, George W. Williams, and these gentlemen with the Mayor constituted the first Board of Trustees. Mr. George R. Emmerton, Dr. James A. Emmerton, Mr. Nathaniel A. Horton, Mr. Charles S. Osgood and Mr. Thomas F. Hunt having died since their election, the vacancies have been filled by the election of David Pingree, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, John Robinson, William P. McMullan, and John M. Raymond. Regular meetings of the Trustees are held on the second and fourth Fridays of each month at 5 o'clock P. M. Organization of the board: John F. Hurley, Chairman; John Robinson, Secretary; George W. Williams, Treasurer; Gardner M. Jones, Librarian. The Library is open every day for the delivery of books (Sundays and legal holidays excepted) from 9 A. M. to 8 P. M., on Saturdays until 9 P. M. The reading room is open every week day from 9 A. M. to 9 P. M., and on Sunday from 2 P. M. to 8 P. M. In the grounds of the library is the finest elm tree anywhere in the region, known as the Bertram elm.

15. SALEM YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION, was organized Nov. 17, 1858, in the South Church chapel. Rented rooms were occupied until Sept. 18, 1884, when it removed to its building on Central street, which it purchased in March of that year. The organization was incorporated Jan. 10, 1884. The annual meeting since November, 1887, has been held the third Wednesday in April. The building is open from 8.30 A. M. to 10 P. M. week days, and men are always welcome. Its equipments consist of an excellent reading room, social room, George L. Ames Memorial hall, seating 800, gymnasium, swimming pool, bowling alleys, bicycle room, boys' rooms, bath rooms, and kitchen. Evening classes, socials, entertainments, gymnasium, debating society, employment bureau, boarding-house register, religious services and Bible classes are the means employed in the work. The boys' branch was started in 1869 and is the oldest in the country. William H. Whipple has had charge since its beginning. At the last annual meeting the Association had 500 members besides 160 in the Boys' Branch and 351 in the Woman's Auxiliary, making nearly 1000 persons who are directly connected with the organization. Early in 1896 the Sanders and Hook estates at corner of

Essex and Sewall streets were purchased as a site for the new association building. Ground was broken Aug. 2, 1897, and the building was first occupied Feb. 1899. Matthew Robson, President; Leland H. 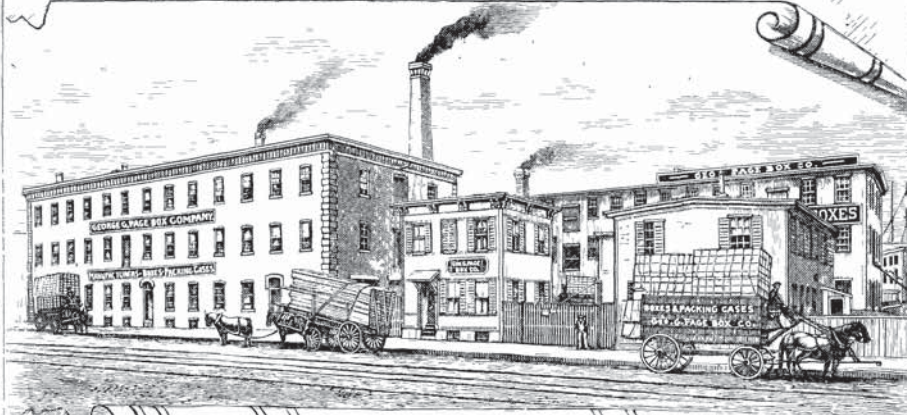

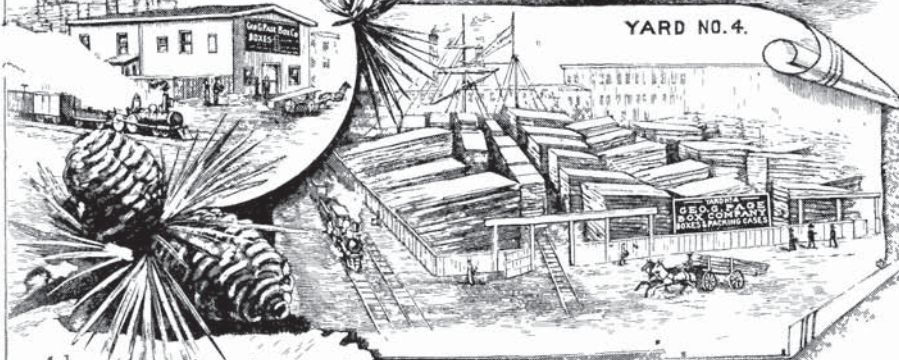

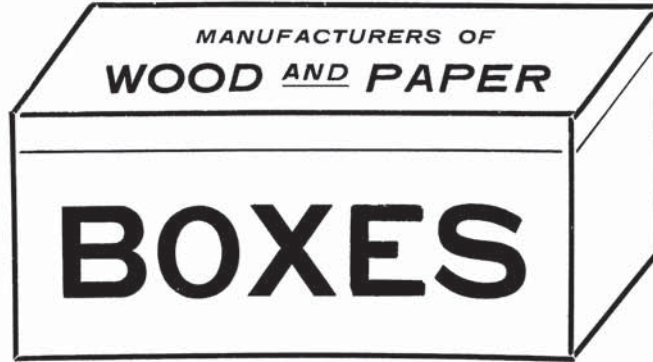
