SALEM FIRE ALARM.

One stroke will be given daily at 6.15
A. M., 12.45 and 6.15 P. M. to test alarm.
Two strokes signify that the fire is out.
Three strokes after alarm calls ladder
truck not answering first alarm.
Four strokes, second alarm.
General alarm, same number of box
repeated once.
Five strokes, repeated three times,
signify call for fire out of city.
Ten strokes, repeated three times, in-
dicates police call.
Three strokes at 11.15 A. M. indicate
double session in the primary school.

Three strokes at ten minutes before
time for closing, double session in gram-
mar schools.
Three strokes at 7.10 A. M. indicates
no morning session of High school.
Three strokes at 7.55 A. M. indicate
"no school" in the forenoon for all the
schools.
Three strokes at 1.30 P. M. indicate
that no afternoon session of the schools
will be held.
Three strokes after an alarm, electric
light signal.
Four blows, repeated three times, mil-
itary call.

SALEM FIRE LIMITS.*(City Ordinances, Chapter 4,—Sec. 8.)*

"SECTION 8. The fire limits of the city of Salem shall include all that part of the city inclosed by the following described lines, to wit: Beginning at the junction of Essex and North streets, thence running northerly through the middle of North street to Lynde street, then easterly through the middle of Lynde street to a point one hundred feet distant from the westerly line of Washington street, then northerly and parallel to the westerly line of Washington street and one hundred feet distant therefrom to the middle of Federal street, thence easterly through the middle of Federal street to a point one hundred feet distant from the easterly line of Washington street, thence southerly and parallel to the easterly line of Washington street and one hundred feet distant therefrom to the middle of Church street, thence easterly through the middle of Church and Brown streets, to Washington square (west), thence southerly through the middle of Washington square (west) and Elm street across Derby street, and continuing on the same course and in a straight line to the channel of South River, thence northwesterly by the channel of South River to and across Lafayette street, thence southerly by the westerly line of Lafayette street to a point in said line one hundred feet distant from the southern line of Dodge street, thence westerly and parallel to the southern line of Dodge street and one hundred feet distant therefrom to a point one hundred feet distant from the easterly line of Washington street, thence southerly in a straight line to the middle of Washington street at a point opposite the center of Poud street, thence westerly and northerly through the middle of Washington and Mill streets, to the middle of Norman street, thence westerly through the middle of Norman street to Summer street, thence northerly through the middle of Summer street to the junction of Essex and North streets and point begun at."

LEGAL HOLIDAYS.

Washington's Birthday, February 22d; Patriot's Day, April 19; Memorial Day, May 30th; Independence Day, July 4th; Labor Day, first Monday in September; Columbus Day, October 12th; Thanksgiving Day; Christmas Day. When the 22d of February, the 19th of April, the 30th of May, the 4th of July, or Christmas Day falls upon Sunday, the following Monday is a legal holiday.

SALEM NICKNAMES.

Salem is unusually prolific in local nomenclature. There is hardly a lane or alley, hill or hollow, which has not borne some nickname more or less appropriate at some period of its history. In this age of directories such names become lost, giving place to the recognized title.

All down town, below Pleasant street, was formally known as Wapping, so named from Wapping in London.

North Salem was christened Pigeonville, and many still call it North Fields, a later title.

Castletonville, now nicknamed Nauvoo, was a locality where Winthrop and Endicott streets now are. A man named Joe Smith built a house there about the same time that Joe Smith, the Mormon, settled Nauvoo.

Roast Meat Hill, applied to the rising ground back of High street.

Knocker's Hole was in the vicinity of Mill and Margin streets. There was a shippyard there in the eighteenth century.

Button Hole was near the jail, and the Button Hole toughs used to have fights with the Knocker's Hole gang.

Vinegar Hill was on Broad street.

Circus lane is now Hathorne street, the fields out that way being let years ago for circus performances.

Liberty Hill is in North Salem, off Appleton street. There was a little picnic ground there years ago and quite a story could be written of its history.

Buffum's corner was at the junction of Boston and Essex streets, named after a Buffum who kept store there, about 200 years ago.

Neck-gate denoted the end of Derby street.

Blubber hollow was from Federal to Goodhue street, also known as Town Ridge.

Johnny Cake Hill stood between Blubber hollow and the big tree on Boston street.

Carltonville is a section of North Salem on Mason street.

From the big tree to the Peabody burying ground was called Trask's plain. The Nubble was a locality near the Peabody burying ground.

Gocse lane ran from Federal to Fowler street.

Lover's lane was off Tremont street.

Plank alley was a part of Elm street between Charter and Essex.

Baptist hill, in the rear of Federal street, named from the First Baptist Church, now called Odell square. They used to baptize in a pond near by.

Gallows hill, in the rear of Boston street, the scene of the Witchcraft executions of 1692 is too well known to require anything beyond mere mention. As also the town pastures and Castle hill, which still hold their names.

Creek street is so named because it is built over what was a creek, but is now culverted over.

School house lane was the early name given Washington street, afterward Court street.

"Nahum Keike," or Naumkeag, was the original Indian name for North river.

Federal street was so named in 1766, as an indication of the united feeling, in favor of something better than an eight-foot way along North River. The portion from Washington to North was previously called Marlborough street; and the eastern portion County street.

Old Paved street was the name of Essex between Washington and North for many years, it being paved about 1773. King street and Main street are also names which have been applied to Essex street.

WARD BOUNDARIES.

WARD 1. All that portion of the city lying east of Washington street, and between Essex street and South river; also Salem Neck and the Islands.

WARD 2. All that portion of the city lying east of Washington street, and between Essex street and North River.

PRECINCT THREE shall consist of all that portion of Ward Two lying and, being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the northeast corner of Essex and Washington streets and running easterly and northerly through the centre of Essex street to Collins' Cove, then by the line of Collins' Cove to Pickman street, then through the centre of Pickman street to the centre of Winter street, then northerly to the northwest corner of Northey and Bridge streets, then westerly to North river at a point near the culvert under the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad, then along North river to a point opposite the centre of Washington street, then southerly through the centre of Washington street to the corner of Essex street, the point begun at.

PRECINCT FOUR shall consist of all that portion lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at a point on North river near the culvert under the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad, then running easterly to the northwest corner of Bridge and Northey streets, then across Bridge street and continuing southeasterly through the centre of Winter street to Pickman street, thence easterly through the centre of Pickman street to Collins' Cove, then by the westerly line of Collins' Cove to Essex bridge, then by the line of North river to the point begun at.

PRECINCT FIVE shall consist of all that portion of Ward Three lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the southwest corner of Essex and Washington street and running through the centre of Essex street to Hamilton street, then through the centre of Hamilton street to and across Chestnut street to Pickering street, then through the centre of Pickering street to Broad street, then through the centre of Broad street to Hathorne street, then through the centre of Hathorne street and continuing on the same line to the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad, then northerly along the track of the Boston & Maine Railroad through the centre of Washington street to Essex street and the point begun at.

PRECINCT SIX shall consist of all that portion of Ward Three lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the corner of Essex and Hamilton streets, then westerly through the centre of Essex street to its junction with Highland avenue, then through the centre of Highland avenue to the Lynn boundary line, then along the boundary line between Lynn and Swampscott to the track of the Boston & Maine Railroad, then northerly along the said railroad track to a point opposite the centre of Hathorne street, then following a line to and through the centre of Hathorne street to Broad street, then through the centre of Broad street to Pickering street, then through the centre of Pickering street to and across Chestnut street to Hamilton street, then through the centre of Hamilton street to Essex street, the point begun at.

PRECINCT SEVEN shall consist of all that portion of Ward Four lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the northwest corner of Essex and Washington streets, then running northerly through the centre of Washington street to the North river, then westerly along North river and the canal to Goodhue street, then along the centre of Goodhue street to and across Boston street to Proctor street, then through the centre of Proctor street to Highland avenue, then northerly through the centre of Highland avenue into and through the centre of Essex street to Washington street, the point begun at.

PRECINCT EIGHT shall consist of all that portion of Ward Four lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the corner of Proctor street and Highland avenue, then northerly through the centre of Proctor street to and across Boston street through the centre of Goodhue street to the North river canal, then following the canal westerly to the Peabody boundary line, then continuing along the Peabody boundary line southerly to the Lynn boundary line, then continuing easterly along the Lynn boundary line to Highland avenue, then northerly through the centre of Highland avenue to Proctor street, the point begun at.

PRECINCT NINE shall consist of all that portion of Ward Five lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing on Lafayette street opposite New Derby street, then running southerly through the centre of Lafayette street to Willow avenue, then easterly through the centre of Willow avenue to Salem Harbor, then by the line of Salem Harbor to and through the centre of South river and the point begun at.

Commencing on Lafayette street opposite New Derby street, then running southerly through the centre of Lafayette street to Willow avenue, then through the centre of Willow avenue to Salem Harbor, then southerly by the line of Salem Harbor to Forest river, then by the Marblehead and Swampscott boundary lines to the track of the Boston & Maine Railroad, then along said railroad track to the station on Washington street opposite New Derby street, then through the centre of New Derby street to Lafayette street and the point begun at.

PRECINCT ELEVEN shall consist of all that part of Ward Six lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the bridge over the North river, then running northwesterly through the centre of North street to Symonds street, then westerly through the centre of Symonds street to Balcomb street, then southerly through the centre of Balcomb street to School street, then westerly through the centre of School street to Tremont street, then northwesterly through the centre of Tremont street to the Peabody boundary line on Highland street, then continuing along the Peabody boundary line to Bass river, then along the shore of Bass river to North river, then along the shores of North river to North river, the point begun at.

PRECINCT TWELVE shall consist of all that part of Ward Six lying and being within the following described lines, viz:—

Commencing at the bridge over the North river, then running northwesterly through the centre of North street to Symonds street, then westerly through the centre of Symonds street to Balcomb street, then southerly through the centre of Balcomb street to School street, then westerly through the centre of School street to Tremont street, then through the centre of Tremont street to the Peabody boundary line at Mt. Vernon street, then continuing along the Peabody boundary line to the North river canal, then along said canal to North bridge and the point begun at.
