PLUMMER HALL.

This building is located at 134 Essex street. It was erected in 1856, from funds left by the late Miss Caroline Plummer.

The first story contains a portion of the library and the historical collections of the Essex Institute, also periodicals

and publications of societies received in exchange.

The second story contains some of the principal works of reference, and the new books belonging to the Salem Athenæum; also the libraries of the Essex South District Medical Society, the Essex Agricultural Society, the Salem Athenaeum, and the Essex Institute. The libraries of the several societies in the building contain about 50,000 bound volumes, besides a large collection of pamphlets.

ESSEX INSTITUTE.

Incorporated in 1848. The Library, which contains about 28,000 volumes, with the historical collections, also portraits, including several of the former Presidents of the Historical Society, and some of the early settlers of New England, are deposited in Plummer Hall. The scientific collections have been placed in the East India Marine Hall. Exhibitions of art, also fruits and flowers, are occasionally held at their room at Plummer Hall. PEABODY ACADEMY OF SCIENCE.

Founded in February, 1867. George Peadody, of London, placed in the hands of nine Trustees, the sum of one hundred and forty thousand dollars; forty thousand to be expended in the purchase of the East India Marine Hall, and the fitting up of the same, for the arrangement of a Museum, with which was incorporated the Museum of the East India Marine Society and the Natural History of the Essex Institute, and for other purposes. The sum of one hundred thousand dollars to be kept as a permanent fund, the income to be appropriated for the promotion of science and useful knowledge in the County of Essex.

Trustees, W. C. Endicott, of Salem; George Peabody Russell, of Bristol, R. I.; O. C. Marsh, of New Haven; Henry Wheatland of Salem; A. C. Goodell, jr., of Salem; James R. Nichols, of Haverhill; S. The Summer School of Biology commences each season, about July 1, continuing about six weeks.

The museum is open to the public every day, except Sundays, from 10 A.M., to 5 P.M.

THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF SCIENCE.

Organized in 1848. It holds its meetings annually, in August, in various parts of the country-each meeting continuing for a week or longer. The Library of the Association and its stock of publications are at 7 Central street, Salem.

SALEM FRATERNITY.
