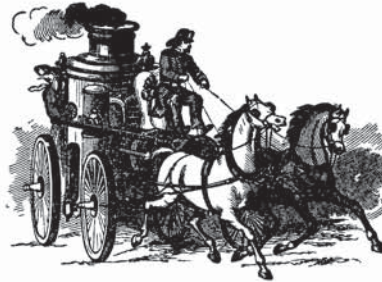

3. CITY ORPHAN ASYLUM OF SALEM, No. 215 Lafayette st. Organized 1866. Conducted by fourteen Sisters of Charity, Lady Superior, Sister Marie A. Costello. This institution provides a home for orphan boys and girls, who receive a due amount of education in the common branches of learning.

4. ESSEX INSTITUTE, 132 and 134 Essex. Open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. every day but Sunday. Open Sundays 2 to 5 p. m. This institution was formed by the union of the Essex Historical and Essex County Natural History Societies, in February, 1848. The former society was incorporated in 1821, the latter in 1836. In February, 1870, an act was passed enlarging the powers of the Institute so as to include among its objects the promotion of the arts, science and literature, in addition to those of the original societies. Its library contains 461,689 volumes, exclusive of duplicates, and embracing all departments of literature. Its museum contains a large collection of antiquarian and historical relics, paintings, engravings, medals, coins, paper currency, etc. The scientific portion is deposited in the

museum of the Peabody Academy of Science. At the time of its removal the collection contained over 125,000 specimens in the departments of Ethnology, Zoology, Botany, Mineralogy and Geology, scientifically arranged and in good part labelled and catalogued. Its publications are the "Proceedings of the Essex Institute," 6 vol.; "The Naturalist," vol. 1 (afterward transferred to the Peabody Academy of Science); "Bulletin of the Essex Institute," 30 volumes, 8 vo.; "Historical Collections of the Essex Institute," 46 vols., 8 vo. Field meetings are held in different parts of the county for scientific and historical investigation and discussion. Evening meetings for the same purpose are regularly held during the winter at the rooms of the Institute. The Institute also gives courses of scientific and other lectures, and series of concerts during the winter months, and horticultural and art exhibitions during the spring, summer and autumn months. Mack, "for the purpose of teaching females of the poorer classes in Salem, useful and ornamental arts, occupations and trades, by which they can support themselves honorably and profitably." 6. ST. JAMES EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTE, No. 162 Federal st. Lady Superior, Sister Marie Gertrude. Teachers, twelve Sisters of Notre Dame.

7. ST. MARY'S EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTE, No. 13 Walnut st. Superior, Sister Marie Eugenia; Teachers, twenty Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, whose mother house is at Madison, N. J.

8. PEABODY ACADEMY OF SCIENCE, PEABODY MUSEUM, 161 Essex street. Museum open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Sundays 2 to 5 p. m. The "Trustees of the Peabody Academy of Science," organized in 1868, having received funds by gift in 1867 from George Peabody of London for the "Promotion of Science and Useful Knowledge in the County of Essex."

Under the instrument of trust East India Marine Hall (erected in 1824), was purchased and refitted, and the Museum of the East India Marine Society (begun in 1799), and the Natural History Collections of the Essex Institute (begun in 1834), received by the trustees as permanent deposits, were placed therein. To these have been added many valuable collections especially in the Oriental department.

The arrangement of the Museum is *educational*, and not merely for the purpose of exhibiting curiosities. It is especially designed to aid the teachers of the county in connection with school work. Cards on many of the objects give lists of books in the Salem Public Library relating to the collections.

The collections in the public exhibition halls may be summarized as follows:—

ENTRANCE CORRIDOR.

Collection illustrating the whaling industry and the natural history of whales; maps of Essex County, Mass.—geological, typographical and coast.

MARINE ROOM.

Collection of portraits of prominent Salem merchants, members and officers of the East India Marine Society, together with many interesting relics connected with the early social character of that institution, nautical instruments and objects associated with a sailor's life and models and pictures of Salem merchant vessels. These are preserved as a special collection in a hall on the first floor and form an interesting memorial of the commercial history of Salem.

HALL OF NATURAL HISTORY. (upstairs)

A nearly complete collection of the animals and minerals and rocks of Essex County; a collection of woods of the trees of Essex County and one of the pre-historic relics of the county; a large collection of the dried plants of the county, in cabinets in the lower rooms, which may be consulted by students upon application at the office.

A synoptical collection illustrating the animal kingdom from the lowest to the highest forms, arranged and labelled according to the text books in common use in schools and colleges.

A type collection of minerals illustrating the edition of Dana's Mineralogy used in schools, and one of fossils illustrating the historical geology of the earth, from the oldest to the most recent formations.

HALL OF ETHNOLOGY.

A collection arranged by countries, of objects illustrating the every-day life, dress and religious customs, the implements of war and of domestic use, and objects of art and the native races of Malay Archipelago, Africa, the Pacific Islands, and North and South America. This collection was begun in 1799 by the East India Marine Society, and has had an uninterrupted existence since that date.

THE WELD HALL.

The most recent addition to the museum, the gift of Dr. Charles G. Weld, opened June 28, 1907. This absolutely fire-proof building provides admirably arranged work rooms and offices on the lower floor, and, above, a hall devoted to the collection of Oriental Ethnology; Japan, Yezo, Korea, China, Siam and India.

Academy Hall, in the addition erected in 1885, has a seating capacity of 350; it is centrally located, comfortably seated, well ventilated, and is in every respect a first class audience room. The hall is used for lectures by the Academy, and is rented for concerts, lectures, and readings.

The Academy has published two volumes of memoirs and annual reports; it has conducted classes in botany, mineralogy, and zoology, and for several years held a summer school of biology.

The average number of visitors to the Museum is about 60,000 annually.

The work of the institution is conducted and the museum maintained entirely from the income of the trust fund and the contributions of generous friends. The annual expenses have increased with the growth of the museum, and the work and usefulness of the institution could always be greatly advanced by additions to its fund and income.

Officers: George Augustus Peabody, Pres.; Elihu Thomson, Vice Pres.; Abner C. Goodell, Sec.; George A. Vickery, Treas.; who, together with John Robinson, Francis H. Lee, Francis H. Appleton and Dudley L. Pick-

man and Richard Wheatland, form the Board of Trustees; Edward S. Morse, Director; Lawrence W. Jenkins, curator of ethnology; Clarence E. Brown, asst. Vertebrate zoology; John Robinson, keeper of the relics of the East India Marine Society; J. Russell Treadwell, janitor in charge of Academy Hall.

9. PLUMMER FARM SCHOOL OF REFORM FOR BOYS. This school was founded by the bequest of Miss Caroline Plummer. It is a school of reform for boys in the city of Salem. The amount of the bequest was \$25,000. Present fund, \$50,000. Inc. May 21, 1855. Building erected in 1870, and school was opened Sept. 23, 1870. Trustees: Jeremiah T. Mahoney, Chairman; John B. Tivnan, John E. Stanton, terms expire Feb. 1, 1911; William M. Jelly, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, terms expire Feb. 1, 1912; William S. McIntire, George M. Whipple, terms expire 1913; Matthew Robson, Frank S. Atwood, terms expire 1914; Aroline C. Gove, Caroline O. Emmerton, terms expire 1915. Annual meeting in December. Superintendent, Frank U. Wetmore; Matron, Mrs. Frank U. Wetmore. A generous bequest of \$35,000 was left to the school by the will of the late Captain John Bertram. Number of boys in school, 35.

10. SALEM ATHENÆUM was incorporated in March, 1810. Its conception was suggested by the Boston Athenæum, organized some three years earlier. The characters of the two institutions are in many respects similar, the incorporated objects of both being the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences. The Salem Athenæum purchased the social and philosophical libraries, the former organized in 1761, the latter in 1781. The Athenæum rooms in Central Building, Market (now Central) street, were opened to the proprietors on Wednesday, July 11, 1810, with a good collection of books, properly arranged and classified. In April, 1815, the library was removed to rooms in Essex Place; in 1825, to rooms over the Salem bank; in 1841, to Lawrence place; in 1857 to Plummer Hall, the first building of the Athenæum situated at 134 Essex street, and in 1907 to the new building situated at 339 Essex street, likewise named Plummer Hall. The present number of volumes is about 26,000. The sum of \$30,000 for the purchasing of land and the erecting thereon a building, was bequeathed by Miss Caroline Plummer, daughter of Dr. Joshua and Olive (Lyman), Plummer, born

Jan. 13, 1780, and died at Salem, May 15, 1854, to the proprietors of the Athenæum. The Athenæum is managed by trustees, annually chosen by the stockholders; each share holder may take out books upon the payment of the annual assessment of five dollars. Trustees: Henry A. 11. SALEM BOARD OF TRADE, 209 Essex, rms. 10 and 11. Organized, June, 1901. Meetings held fourth Friday of each month except July, August and September. Officers are elected in April. John C. Robson, Pres.; Leland H. Cole, W. F. Cass, George W. Pitman, Vice Pres.; Ernest P. Lane, Sec.; Josiah H. Gifford, Treas.; Charles A. Archer, John F. Cabeen, George W. Pickering, William S. Felton, Silas Boyes, A. M. Joly, J. Webster Dane, Henry M. Batchelder, J. Clark Brown, and the Mayor, *ex-officio*, Directors.

12. SALEM MARINE SOCIETY. Instituted March 25, 1766. Inc. April, 1772. Meetings held last Thursday evenings of January, April, July, and October at Franklin Building. Officers elected at annual meeting in October. Chas. O. Welch, Master; W. Frank Powars, Dep. Master; Edward B. Trumbull, Treas. and Agent; J. C. Entwisle, Clk.

13. SALEM EAST INDIA MARINE SOCIETY. Founded in October, 1799. Incorporated in 1801. Membership restricted "to persons who have actually navigated the seas beyond the Cape of Good Hope or Capt Horn." Its chief objects: 1st, to assist the widowers who may need it, from the wives and children of deceased members of the society, 2d, to collect such facts and observations as tend to the improvement and security of navigation; 3d, to form a museum of natural and artificial curiosities, particularly such as are to be found beyond the Cape of Good Hope and Cape Horn. The collections formed were first deposited in the building on the corner of Essex and Washington streets. In 1804 they were removed to the Salem Bank Building on the site of Downing's Block, and in 1825 to the East India Marine Hall, erected for the accommodation of this valuable collection. In 1867 the building was sold to the Trustees of the Peabody Academy of Science, and the museum was

placed in the hands of the Academy trustees as a permanent deposit. Although no longer conducting the museum, or making nautical observations, the charitable objects of the society are fully carried out through the means of a fund of considerable amount in possession of the society. Meetings are held quarterly at E. I. Marine hall. Officers elected second Wednesday in January. Pres. Albert P. Goodhue; Sec. and Treas., J. Clifford Entwisle; Committee of Observation, Edward B. Trumbull, Walter H. Trumbull; Distributing Committee, J. Clifford Entwisle, Edward B. Trumbull, James F. Johnson.

14. THE SALEM FRATERNITY was organized in 1869 to provide evening instruction and amusement for those who "being confined to their work during the day need recreation at the close of their labors."

A few years' experience showed that the greatest need was among the boys and young men. Thus began the work of the oldest "Boy's Club" in the country. After renting various rooms, a permanent and suitable "home" for the work was secured in 1899 in the "Old Bank Building," at 11 Central st. The rooms are open from 8 a. m. to 12 m. and 7 to 9 p. m. (except holidays). The attendance is about 45,000 by some 3,000 different boys every year. The entertainment and instruction is largely provided by volunteer helpers.

The Indoor Work. The gymnasium and free shower baths are open every day from 8 a. m. to 12 m. and 7 to 9 p. m. except holidays.

Hand Craft Classes are maintained in printing, cobbling, carpentering, basket making, fret sawing, clay modeling, wood burning, wood carving, from fall to spring. There is also a chance for foreign boys to learn English, even when the evening schools are not in session. Several Debating and Study Clubs are maintained.

A Reading Room and Library of 700 "Books for Boys" are maintained; also, a penny savings bank and a free employment bureau.

The Game Room is perhaps the most important of any department, for it is here that the personal influence of the volunteer helper touches the life of the boy in his play, and with lasting effect.

The Outdoor Work has consisted of Holiday Excursions, Baseball and outdoor games, and ten weeks of "Camping Out" during the summer, when 100 boys are given "a week in the

country" at the permanent camp at Sawyer's Island, Rowley, Mass.

Evening School, fall term continues from Sept. until city evening schools open, spring term begins when city schools close and continues until the last of June. There are about 150 volunteer teachers, half of these coming from the Normal school.

15. SALEM HOSPITAL, organized Apr. 7, 1873, from a fund contributed by Capt. John Bertram and other citizens. Applications for admission to be made to the intern at the hospital, 31 Charter st. Open daily for reception of visitors from 2 to 3 p. m. Annual meeting last Thursday of January. Arthur W. West, Pres.; Trustees, Walter H. Trumbull, Arthur W. West, George Chase, Matthew Robson, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, John Robinson, Edward C. Browne, William P. McMullan, Charles S. Rea, Geo. H. Shattuck, John Pickering, George A. A training school for nurses is connected with the hospital, its object being to supply Salem and vicinity with educated nurses. The time required for the education of a nurse is two and one-half years, at the end of which diplomas are given to those pupils who have fulfilled all the requirements.

16. SALEM PUBLIC LIBRARY. On the first of December, 1887, the heirs of Capt. John Bertram offered to the city his late residence on Essex street to be used for the purpose of establishing a Public Library. On the twenty-seventh of December, 1887, the city accepted the gift, and instructed its committee to petition the Legislature for authority to issue bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for the use of the library. The library was opened to the public for the delivery of books July 8, 1889. There are now (1910)

in the library 52,000 vols. By the provision of the deed of gift, the management of the library is vested in a board of seven trustees, six selected for life by the City Council, and the Mayor of the city for the time being, the remaining member *ex-officio* and the chairman of the Board. The City Council elected the following gentlemen as trustees for life: George R. Emmerton, James A. Emmerton, Nathaniel A. Horton, Thos. F. Hunt, Chas. S. Osgood, George W. Williams, and these gentlemen, with the Mayor, constituted the first Board of Trustees. These trustees having since died, the vacancies have been filled by election. The present trustees are: Arthur Howard, David Pingree, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, Matthew Robson, William P. McMullan, John M. Raymond, and Arthur H. Phippen. Regular meetings of the Trustees held on the second and fourth Fridays of each month at 5 o'clock p. m. Organization of the Board: Arthur Howard, Chairman; Arthur H. Phippen, Sec.; William P. McMullan, Treas.; Gardner M. Jones, Librarian. The library is open every day for the delivery of books. (Sundays and legal holidays excepted), from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m.; on Saturdays until 9 p. m. The reading room is open every week day from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m., and on Sunday from 2 p. m. to 8 p. m. In the grounds of the library is the finest elm tree anywhere in the region, known as the Bertram elm.

**REGULATIONS FOR HACKNEY CARRIAGES IN THE CITY OF SALEM.
ADOPTED JAN. 4 AND MAY 4, 1909, BY BOARD OF ALDERMEN.**

ORDERED, That, until otherwise ordered, the price or rates of fare to be taken by, or paid to, the owner, driver, or other person having charge of any licensed hackney carriage, except omnibuses and barges, shall be as follows:

SECTION 1. For the conveyance from one place to another within the limits of that part of the city lying and being within the following described boundaries, viz: Commencing at the junction of Essex and Webb streets, thence running southerly through Webb street to Salem harbor, thence westerly by said harbor to Union street bridge, thence easterly and southerly by said harbor to Ocean avenue, thence by Ocean avenue to the track of the Boston & Maine Railroad Co., thence northerly by said track to Margin street, thence southerly and westerly by Margin street and the Mill Pond to the southern end of Hathorne street; thence westerly by the eastern line of the Great Pastures to Highland avenue, thence by Essex, Boston, Grove, Mason, Barr, School and Orne streets to Walter street; thence through Walter street to the eastern end thereof, and continuing on the same course to the North river, thence westerly by said river to the bridge on North street; thence easterly by the southern line of North river to the northern end of March street; thence by March, Bridge, and Osgood streets to Collins Cove; thence westerly by Collins Cove to Webb street; thence southerly through Webb street to the point begun at; of one or more adult passengers, twenty-five cents each.

SECT. 2. For one or more adult passengers from any place in the city within said limits to any place in the city beyond said limits, but within Block House square, the junction of Lafayette street and Lynn road, the Glue Works on Highland avenue, Prospect, Varney, Rawlins, Watson, Grove, Mason, Myrtle, School and Northend streets, Liberty Hill road, Appleton and Orne streets, and Beverly Bridge, or vice versa; thirty-five cents each.

SECT. 3. For one or more adult passengers from one extreme to another extreme of the limits described in the second section, fifty cents each.

SECT. 4. From Washington street to the depots, or any place in the city east of Washington street, and between North and South rivers to the Willows, Juniper, or Winter Island, or vice versa, for one adult passenger,

seventy-five cents; for two adult passengers, fifty cents each; for three or more adult passengers, thirty-five cents each.

From any place in the city beyond the limits hereinbefore stated in this section, but within Ocean avenue, Boston, Grove, Mason, School and Orne streets, to the Willows, Juniper, or Winter Island, or vice versa, for one adult passenger, one dollar; for two or more adult passengers, fifty cents each.

SECT. 5. From any place within the limits mentioned in Section One to Harmony Grove, for one adult passenger, seventy-five cents; for two adult passengers, fifty cents each; for three or more adult passengers, thirty-five cents each. For returning therefrom with same passengers and without delay, fifty cents; whether for one or more passengers.

SECT. 6. For the conveyance of persons to any place not hereinbefore specified, and for funerals, special reasonable rates may be charged.

SECT. 7. The charge for hackney carriages drawn by two horses, when hired by the hour, shall be not exceeding one dollar and fifty cents per hour; and when drawn by one horse one dollar per hour, and for parts of hours after the first hour a proportional part of the rate for one hour. When a carriage is to be used for three or more consecutive hours such charge, not exceeding one dollar per hour for a two-horse carriage and seventy-five cents per hour for a one-horse carriage, may be made, as may be agreed upon between the owner and the party hiring the same.

SECT. 8. For children under six years of age, with an adult, no charge will be made. For children between six and twelve years of age, when accompanied by an adult, the fare shall be half the price charged for an adult, and when not accompanied by an adult full fare may be charged.

SECT. 9. Between the hours of ten o'clock at night and half past six o'clock in the morning, double the above established rates may be charged.

SECT. 10. No charge shall be made for one trunk, and the valise, carpet bags, portmanteaus, bundles and baskets of each passenger, but for each additional trunk, more than one, fifteen cents may be charged; and the owner or driver of any hackney carriage shall not be required to take or deposit the baggage of any passen-

ger, except from or in the hall or vestibule of any residence or building in the city.

SECT. 11. Where any street is mentioned in this order as the boundary of any limit, both sides of the street shall be deemed to be and are included within such limit.

SECT. 12. No owner, driver, or other person having charge of any hackney carriage or other vehicle used as a public conveyance, shall receive, or permit to be placed, or convey in any manner in or upon said carriage or other vehicle, any person sick or infected with the small-pox or any other contagious disease; or the body of any person who had died of small-

pox or any other contagious disease, under penalty of forfeiture of his license.

SECT. 13. Any owner, driver, or other person having charge of a hackney carriage or other vehicle used as a public conveyance, who violates the provisions of section ten of these regulations relating to the transportation of baggage, or who, being otherwise unengaged, refuses to accommodate any passenger wishing to hire him or to transport said passenger's baggage, shall, if complaint be made in writing to the Board of Aldermen, have his license revoked, if, after due hearing, the facts warrant the same.

PRECINCT BOUNDARIES.

PRECINCT ONE, all that portion of Ward 1, lying east of the center of Daniels street.

PRECINCT TWO, all that portion of Ward 1, lying west of the center of Daniels street.

PRECINCT THREE, all that portion of Ward 2, within the following lines, viz: Commencing at the corner of Essex and Washington streets, thence running easterly through the center of Essex street to Collins Cove, then by the center of Collins Cove to Briggs street, thence through the center of Briggs street, Washington square and Winter street to the western corner of Northey and Bridge street, then westerly by Bridge street, including both sides thereof to Washington street, thence southerly through the center of Washington street to the corner of Essex and Washington streets and point begun at.

PRECINCT FOUR, all that portion of Ward 2, within the following lines, viz: Commencing at a portion on North River, near the foot of Northey street, then running southerly by Northey street, including both sides of said street, and all of Woodbury court to Bridge street, thence across Bridge street and continuing southerly through the center of Winter street, thence easterly and southerly through the center of Washington Square to Briggs street, thence easterly through the center of Briggs street to Collins Cove, thence by the northern and western lines of Collins Cove and Beverly harbor to Essex Bridge, thence northerly and westerly by the line of North River to the point begun at.

PRECINCT FIVE, all of that portion of Ward 3 lying east and south of a line commencing at the corner of Essex and Summer streets, thence running through the center of Summer street to Broad street, thence westerly through the center of Broad street to Hathorne street, thence southeasterly through the center of Hathorne street to the Mill Pond, and continuing in the same direction on a straight line to the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad.

PRECINCT SIX, all of that portion of Ward 3 lying west and north of a line commencing at the corner of Essex and Summer streets, thence running southerly through the center of Summer street to Broad street, thence westerly through the center of Broad street to Hathorne street, thence southeasterly through the center of Hathorne street to the Mill Pond, and continuing in the same direction on a straight line to the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad.

PRECINCT SEVEN, all that portion of Ward 4 within the following lines, viz: Commencing at the corner of Essex and Washington streets, thence running northerly through the center of Washington street to North river, thence southwesterly and northwesterly by the line of North river and the North River Canal to Grove street, thence through the center of Grove street to Goodhue street, thence through the center of Goodhue street, to the junction of Goodhue and Bridge streets, thence by the northeast and southeast lines of Hose House No. 4 to Boston street, thence easterly through the center of Boston street to Essex street, thence through the center of Essex and Washington streets and point begun at.

PRECINCT EIGHT, all that portion of Ward 4, within the following lines, viz: Commencing at the corner of Essex and Boston streets, thence running westerly through the center of Boston street to Hose House No. 4, thence by the southeast and northeast lines of said hose house to the junction of Bridge and Goodhue streets, thence through the center of Goodhue street to Grove street, then through the center of Grove street to North River Canal, then northerly by said canal, and the railroad tracks to the Salem and Peabody boundary line, thence continuing by said boundary line in a general southwest-erly direction to and across Boston street, and on the same course by said boundary line to the boundary line between Lynn and Salem, thence continu-ing easterly by the last named boundary line to Highland avenue, thence continu-ing southeasterly through the center of Highland avenue and Essex street to the corner of Essex and Boston streets and points begun at.

PRECINCT NINE, all that portion of Ward 5 within the following lines, viz: Commencing on Lafayette street at South Bridge, thence running south-erly through the center of Lafayette street to Leach street, thence easterly through the center of Leach street to Salem Harbor, thence northerly, easterly, and again northerly by the line of Salem Harbor, and westerly by the line of South River to South Bridge and the point begun at.

PRECINCT TEN, all that portion of Ward 5, within the following lines, viz: Commencing on Lafayette street at South Bridge, thence running south-erly through the center of Lafayette street to Leach street, thence easterly through the center of Leach street to Salem Harbor, thence in a general south-easterly and southwesterly direction by the line of Salem Harbor to the Forest River Lead Mills, thence southwesterly and westerly by the Marblehead and Swampscott boundary lines to a point where the last named boundary line crosses the main tracks of the Eastern Railroad near Thompson's meadow, thence northeasterly and northerly by said tracks to the Eastern Railroad Depot, thence easterly by the line of South River to South Bridge and the point begun at.

PRECINCT ELEVEN, all that part of Ward 6 lying east and north of a line commencing at the bridge over North River, thence running northwesterly through the center of North street to School street, thence westerly through the center of School street to Tremont street, thence northwesterly through the center of Tremont street to Peabody line.

PRECINCT TWELVE, all of that part of Ward 6 lying west and south of a line commencing at the bridge over North River, thence running northwesterly through the center of North street to School street, thence westerly through the center of School street to Tremont street, thence northwesterly through the center of Tremont street to the Peabody line.

STATE NORMAL SCHOOL, SALEM

This school was opened Sept. 12, 1854. It was the fourth normal school established by the State of Massachusetts, and is one of the oldest in the country. Richard Edwards, L. L. D., was principal three years; Prof. Alpheus Crosby, eight years; Daniel B. Hagar, Ph. D., thirty-one years; Walter P. Beckwith, Ph. D., ten years. The present principal began service January 30, 1906. The regular course of study occupies two years. Course for commercial teachers, three years. Advanced courses of one year are offered for graduates of colleges and normal schools, and teachers of experience. Tuition and text books are free. Pecuniary aid is given to needy pupils. The Normal school building, cor. Broad and Summer streets, was dedicated Sept. 14, 1854, and was remodelled in 1871. The fine new school building at the corner of Lafayette street and Loring avenue was dedicated Jan. 26, 1897.

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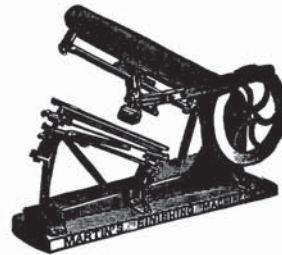
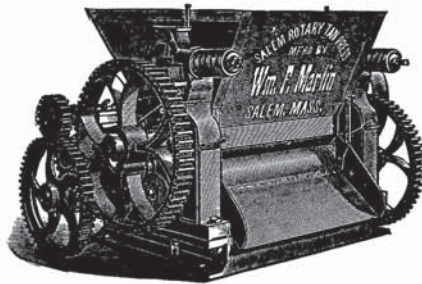
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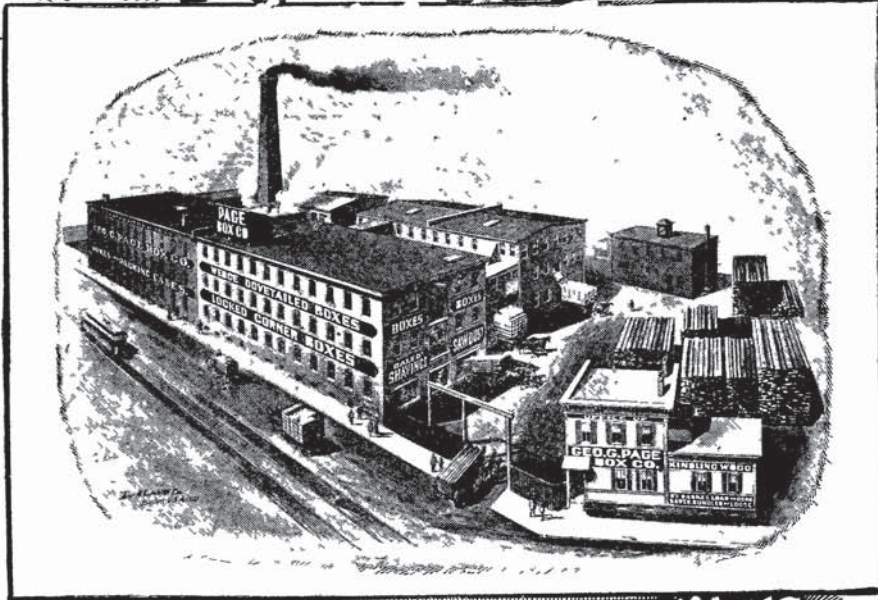
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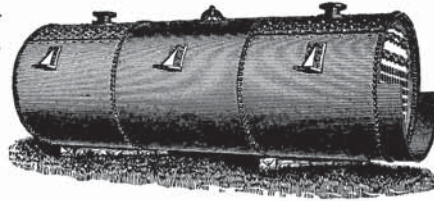
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
